Editor's Notes | Civility

Have you Done your Homework for the Upcoming Elections?

TITH POLITICAL PRIMARIES occurring in several states, the U.S. Catholic Bishops at their November 2023 Assembly, approved supplementary materials for the document Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship, a teaching document on the political responsibility of Catholics. The statement provides guidance for Catholics in the exercise of their rights and duties as participants in our democracy.

The Catholic bishops identify the four main principles of the church's social teaching and apply them to some concrete issues. This is not to tell the faithful for whom or against to vote, but instead to help them form their consciences by God's truth as they approach this often-challenging decision.

As we approach the elections, the bishops urge pastors, lay and religious faithful, and all people of goodwill to use this statement to help form their consciences; to teach those entrusted to their care; to contribute to civil and respectful public dialogue; and to shape political choices in the coming election in light of Catholic teaching. The statement "lifts up our dual heritage as both faithful Catholics and American citizens with rights and duties as participants in the civil order," the bishops said.

Civilize It: A Better Kind of Politics

In addition to their document on Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops launched a campaign in 2020 inviting Catholics to model civility and love for neighbor throughout the year. Civilize It: A Better Kind of Politics is a response to Pope Francis' invitation to seek the truth, build bridges and find solutions together that promote the common good.
