It all began on Sept. 8, 1565, when Don Pedro Menéndez de Avilés landed in what is now St. Augustine, claimed Florida for Spain, and founded a settlement that would become the oldest continuously occupied European community in the continental United States.

Upon arrival, Father Francisco López de Mendoza Grajales celebrated the first Catholic Mass of Thanksgiving on these shores — the moment when the Catholic faith first took root in this land and the city of St. Augustine was established, forever joining faith and history.
